Local Area Agreement - Refresh 2010/11

1 Purpose of the Report

1.1 To agree amendments to the targets for two indicators in the Coventry Local Area Agreement for submission of the Agreement to government.

2 Recommendations

2.1 Council is recommended to formally adopt the revised draft Coventry Local Area Agreement indicators and targets (set out in appendix A).

3 Information/Background

- 3.1 The Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 required every local authority area to develop a Sustainable Community Strategy setting out the vision and priorities for the local area and to agree a new Local Area Agreement with central government. The Government expects Local Area Agreements to balance the delivery of the local priorities on the one hand with the delivery of national priorities, as expressed by the Government's new national indicator set for local government and its partners, on the other.
- 3.2 The Coventry Local Area Agreement 2008-2011 (LAA) is based on local priorities that local people and communities think important such as priorities around employment, skills, health housing, community safety and the environment. The agreement was produced through negotiations between the Coventry Partnership, including Coventry City Council, and central government and sets out the priorities, indicators and targets that have been agreed.
- 3.3 The Coventry Local Area Agreement was endorsed by the Coventry Partnership Board at their meeting on 8 May 2008 and approved by Coventry City Council at a meeting of full council on 27 May 2008 and signed on behalf of the government by the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, Hazel Blears MP on 30 June 2008.

- 3.4 Every LAA is subject of an annual "review and refresh" by central government to assess progress and change targets where it is considered necessary.
- 3.5 On 17th March 2009, following work with partners and discussions with government, the Council adopted revisions to the LAA which reflected changes and developments to the National Indicator Set.
- 3.6 As the LAA enters its final year, government has limited the scope of the annual review and refresh a small number of indicators that it had identified last year as being affected by the national economic situation, indicators with deferred targets and indicators drawn from the Place Survey. The process has been led by the Government Offices on behalf of the range of departments responsible for LAA indicators with appropriate local partners from the Coventry Partnership and the approach to amendments was endorsed by the Local Public Service Board at its meeting on 17th February 2010.

4 Refresh of Coventry Local Area Agreement

- 4.1 It is not proposed to change any of the priorities and indicators in the LAA.
- 4.2 Following negotiations by the relevant partner organisations with central government changes to the targets for two indicators are proposed for 2010/11 and these are included in the revised table set out in appendix A.
- 4.3 National Indicator 154 measures the net additional number of new homes built (build completions, minus demolitions, plus any gains or losses through change of use and conversions) and has been significantly affected by the national economic situation. This refresh makes changes to the targets for the 2009/10 and 2010/11 years based on the housing trajectory prepared for Coventry's Core Strategy examination and in line with the recommendations for phasing Coventry's housing requirement under the Regional Spatial Strategy Phase 2 Panel Report made in November 2009. This approach was endorsed at the Coventry Partnership's Housing Theme Group on 11th December.
- 4.4 National Indicator 152 measures the percentage of the working age population who are claiming out of work benefits and Coventry like other areas has seen this figure rise. In the future, this indicator will form part of the Multi Area Agreement on Employment and Skills which was approved by Council on 29th June 2009 and will be delivered in partnership with Birmingham; Solihull; Sandwell; Dudley; Walsall; Wolverhampton and Telford and Wrekin. The proposed target for the final year of the LAA is based on achieving a 0.1% decrease on the most recent position (which has increased for each of the last four quarters). Government requires that the target is expressed in line with the proposed framework for the Multi Area Agreement, in terms of the gap between the Coventry position and the England average. This approach is based on work with partners and was endorsed at the Coventry Partnership's Economy Learning Skills and Employment Theme Group on 8th March 2010.
- 4.5 There are a number of indicators not showing final year targets. The LAA includes 10 mandatory indicators for children and young people related to early years and children's educational attainment. These are negotiated through a separate process with the Department for Children Schools and Families and targets for these indicators are set annually and do not form part of the LAA refresh. National Indicator 112 measures the under 18 conception rate. The target for 2010/11 is left blank as the only target that government will allow local areas to include is the National Teenage Pregnancy Strategy 2010 target, which was set ten years ago and will not be achieved. Partners remain

committed to improving performance for this local priority and progress will continue to be monitored and reported as part of the LAA process.

5 Proposal and Other Option(s) to be Considered

5.1 The council has a statutory duty to agree a LAA with central government and agree annual amendments through negotiations.

6.2 The Local Area Agreement sets out priorities, targets and indicators for the council and delivery plans have been developed to achieve them. The LAA aims to improve equality of opportunity and to make the city more sustainable and tackle climate change and has implications for the council's and our partners' services and for partnership working. The

development and refresh of the LAA has involved a range of partners including the voluntary sector and it will inform the council's choice of priorities and targets and be continue to be used to measure and manage the council's and its partners performance in the future.

- 6.3 **Equal Opportunities** –The LAA was developed from the Sustainable Community Strategy which was based upon a strategic assessment of the city which considered the needs of different communities and issues of race, gender and disability. Consultation on the strategy has involved a wider range of different local communities and interests. Each of the action plans for the indicators in the Local Area Agreement address equality of opportunity and actions are targeted accordingly.
- 6.4 **Finance** the government has allocated funding for a national reward grant fund for the delivery of new Local Area Agreements although this is relatively small and it is not yet clear how this will be allocated. The Area Based Grant, directly allocated to local authorities annually from April 2008, is made up from a number of specific ring-fenced grants previously received by the council and other partners with the expectation that this will be used locally to improve performance and achieve priority outcomes. The LAA directly influences how this funding is allocated.
- 6.5 **Legal** the council has a statutory requirement to agree and submit a Local Area Agreement to central government under the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007.

7 Monitoring

- 7.1 Progress on the Local Area Agreement is reported to Cabinet and Scrutiny every six months and annually to full council. The most recent progress report on the LAA was prepared in December 2009 for consideration by the Local Public Service Board (2nd December), Scrutiny Co-ordination Committee (8th December) and Cabinet (9th December).
- 7.2 Detailed technical guidance sits behind each indicator and progress on many of the indicators is reported through central government departments with performance being monitored through a new national Data Hub and the Audit Commission's Oneplace website. Reporting frequency is dependant on the basis on which the data for each indicator is collected.
- 7.3 The LAA is the main focus for the new performance assessment of the council and its partners through the Comprehensive Area Assessment, although the council's performance will also be measured on all of the national performance indicators and through the Use of Resources assessment.

8 Timescale and expected outcomes

- 8.1 The Local Area Agreement runs for three years from April 2008 to March 2011. This year's annual refresh of the Local Area Agreement will impact on the final year of the agreement.
- 8.2 Central government will sign off the Local Area Agreement by 31st March 2010 and requires the Coventry Partnership to agree the refreshed LAA and for it to be formally approved by the City Council.
- 8.3 The purpose of the LAA is to improve performance on short term priorities for the people of Coventry and deliver long term outcomes of the Coventry Sustainable Community Strategy.

The priorities, indicators and targets and proposed amendments to the Coventry Local Area Agreement are set out in appendix A.
