Title: Coventry and Warwickshire Place Forum Update

1 Purpose

1.1 This paper updates the Health and Wellbeing Board on the outcomes of the joint meeting of the Place Forum and Health and Care Partnership Board on 15 July 2020.

2 Recommendations

2.1 The Health and Wellbeing Board is asked to:

- Note the outcomes of the joint meeting of the Place Forum and Health and Care Partnership Board on 15 July 2020; and
- Note that proposals for the November meeting of the Place Forum will be brought to a future meeting of the Board.

3 Background

3.1 Following agreement by Coventry and Warwickshire's two Health and Wellbeing Boards, an online joint meeting of the Coventry and Warwickshire Place Forum and the Health and Care Partnership Board was held on 15 July 2020. The meeting was joined by over 70 people.

3.2 The main aims of this session were to:

- reflect on the experience and learning for the health and wellbeing system from the COVID19 pandemic;
- understand how the pandemic has affected our local communities;
- share plans for ongoing virus management and restoration and recovery; and
- provide key business updates.

4 Outcomes of the 15 July Joint Meeting

4.1 The meeting was a valuable opportunity for system leaders to regroup and to start to have wider conversations about the implications of COVID19 for work together as a wider health and wellbeing system and to begin to consider the route forward.

4.2 The meeting agenda included a series of presentations, with opportunity for questions and interaction through the 'chat' function. It covered:


- Two case study examples of learning from the system COVID19 response:
 - an emerging system-wide approach to staff wellbeing, led by Coventry and Warwickshire Partnership Trust; and
 - collaborative action between NHS, local authorities and community and voluntary sector partners to implement the national discharge requirements locally
- Findings about the impact of COVID19 on our communities from a rapid COVID19 health needs assessment undertaken collaboratively by local authority and CCG insight and intelligence teams
- Details of the COVID19 Local Outbreak Control Plans and the role of Warwickshire, Coventry and Solihull as one of 11 national beacon sites for implementation of the Test and Trace programme
- Plans to reset health and wellbeing priorities in Coventry and Warwickshire, and details of the NHS COVID19 Restoration and Recovery programme, including examples from Primary Care and Cancer Care of how services have adapted
- An update on the planned merger of the three CCGs, which remains on track for national approval in autumn 2020, to be effective from April 2021.

Key themes emerging from the questions and discussion included:

- The significance of the potential long-term impact of COVID19 on local communities and the imperative to work together, coherently, and take both collective and organisational responsibility for addressing health inequalities
- The importance of the Test and Trace programme as a long-term priority in managing the ongoing pandemic and addressing consequent inequalities
- Communications and engagement, and the need to work with communities and build trust to ensure key prevention messages resonate and are 'culturally competent', particularly for more vulnerable population groups
- Rapid increase in digital healthcare (telephone and video consultations) and the need for proper evaluation of the impact and implications for different communities
- Seeking assurance regarding support for care homes in preventing and managing outbreaks, and around the impact of changes to health service delivery, including outpatients, maternity and phlebotomy.

The population health model (below) underpinned all of the presentations. There was a clear theme running through the meeting that we need to deepen our understanding of the local population and be intelligence-led in our response and recovery plans; and that partners need to work cohesively as a system, across organisations, recognising the potential of this combined influence to address the social, economic and environmental impacts of the pandemic on population health and to address inequalities.



4.3 The following next steps were agreed:

- Ensure that the achievements, challenges and lessons learnt from the system-wide response to the pandemic are captured and harnessed to inform future activity
- Use the Coventry and Warwickshire COVID-19 Health Assessment to inform recovery, restoration and reset plans as a system, in our places and in our organisations
- Work collectively as a system to ensure that priority is given to addressing inequalities in outbreak management and recovery plans
- Re-emphasise our system commitment to health and wellbeing in its widest sense by ensuring our population health model is the framework for all outbreak management, prevention and recovery activity
- Support development of place recovery plans, working together with local communities to tackle inequalities and improve population health.

5 Future Plans

5.1 The next meetings of the Place Forum and the Health and Care Partnership Board are scheduled to take place on 3 November 2020.

5.2 At the Place Forum meeting on 3 March, there was support for a proposal to hold a summit event, involving wider colleagues from the voluntary and community sector, primary care and community services, focused around the five year plan. An event in this form was not

feasible in the current context but it is possible that this proposal could be revisited and, if appropriate at the time, the opportunity could be taken in November to connect with a wider audience.

- 5.3 Proposals for the November meeting will be developed and brought to a future meeting of the Board.
