Mohammed Naseer Qadiri applied for a premises licence for Qadz Local, 1A Heath Road, Coventry, CV2 4PY in January 2012 to sell alcohol. The licence was granted on $14^{\text {th }}$ February 2012.

The premises have been subject to a number of inspection visits from the Trading Standards team looking for illegal tobacco products (products that are counterfeit and/or smuggled or duty free which do not display health warnings in English.

Cheap tobacco goods, with foreign language labelling undermine work to reduce health inequalities. It also puts them in the 'the price bracket' of persons under the age of 18 , as they are sold at less than half price. Selling such goods also undermines fair competition and often results in complaints from legitimate traders who are complying with the law.

Following a complaint that young people under the age of 18 could purchase cigarettes from the premises a 16 year old volunteer was able to purchase a pack of 20 cigarettes for $£ 3$. Further examination of the premises by officers found a hidden tray of illegal tobacco products.

The applicant, on behalf of the Trading Standards Section state the grounds for this review are therefore based upon the sale of an age restricted product to a 16 year old and the possession and supply of illegal tobacco products from these premises.

The history of interactions with Trading Standards Officers will illustrate this allegation and is detailed below.

## Please provide as much information as possible to support the application

 (please read guidance note 3)Chronological events are as follows:-
$31^{\text {st }}$ December 2016 - An anonymous report was received by Trading standards that 'kids' were smoking outside the premises and underage sales had been witnessed. The report stated this had been continuing for months.
$21^{\text {st }}$ June 2017 - A young volunteer 16 years old undertook a controlled test purchase of cigarettes carrying a video recording bag. The young volunteer asked for 'cheap' cigarettes. The person who was serving in the premises went to an area between the refrigerator and the crisps in racks and obtained a packet of cigarettes for $£ 3$ (image appended at 1 below). The money paid was rang into the till and then placed into the till (image appended at 2 below of money under cash tray). After the child had left officers returned to the premises and searched for any illicit tobacco products. Officers found a tray of cigarettes with foreign language labels and products that were considered counterfeit hidden in the area between the refrigerator and the crisps in racks.

The contents of the tray were seized and found to be:
13 NZ Gold (20s), 3 Viceroy (20s), 2 Winston (20s), 2 Marlboro Red (20s), 6 L \& M (20s), 3 Фعct (fest) (20s) 2 Marlboro Gold (20s) 3 Mayfair (20s) and 1 Richmond (20s). Total 38 packs (image appended at 3 below).

29 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ June 2017 - Mr Qadiri, was interviewed under caution, he stated that the sales assistant was a friend of his friend, who had introduced her to him. His friend served in the store without payment so that Mr Qadiri could have a break and have time with his family. He stated it was his friend's cigarettes that the assistant had sold. He had given her 1 days training in the shop and she later worked for 2 hours and when the test purchase was undertaken this was her third time of being in the shop.

He produced a refusals book with entries included but none recently. A copy of the CCTV recording of the day of the test purchase was requested (and has not been received). Mr Qadiri stated that as he sold alcohol he did not have friends in the Muslim community.

He told the assistant to make checks and to operate the Challenge 25 policy for alcohol but only 18 if cigarettes were sold.

29th June 2017 the sales assistant was also interviewed under caution and recounted almost exactly the same explanation of events, as Mr Qadiri and she stated you could get cheap cigarettes in a lot of places. She stated that she believed the young person was over 18 . However, she later admitted the offence of selling to someone under 18 only.
$30^{\text {th }}$ June 2017 - An officer delivered a letter to the house of the friend seeking a formal interview under caution, after this he went to Qadz Local to obtain the CCTV footage requested. He found Mr Qadiri with a black plastic bag in his hand which he asked to look at, Mr Qadiri ran past the officer out of the shop. On returning (without the bag) he stated the bag contained condoms.

$7^{\text {th }}$ July 2017 - The friend attended a PACE interview and stated that the cigarettes were his and he had not sought permission from Mr Qadiri to sell them in his premises. He had been offered them by a Kurdish male and wanted to make some money to start a security business. He has just completed his first part of his SIA training to obtain a licence at Henley College. He does not recall a specific cost but estimates $£ 30$ to $£ 50$. He states he was making 50 p per packet with the money being rang into the till and kept below the money tray (images appended). If this is the case would Mr Qadiri not wonder why there was money below the normal cash tray? He had introduced the sales assistant to Mr Qadiri. He admits that the sale of counterfeit, incorrectly labelled tobacco is illegal.

## Other Considerations

Safeguarding Children agreed the following conditions with Mr Qadiri prior to the licence being granted.

- If a young person, who appears to be 25 or under wanting to purchase alcohol, they will be required to prove their age before they are served, The forms of proof of age that we will accept are a passport, a photo driving licence, or a proof-ofage card that has the PASS accreditation hologram on it. Photocopies will not be accepted. All staff will be trained in this policy and reminded about it frequently. Records of this training will be kept.
- A notice advising customers that they may be required to prove their age before they can buy alcohol will be displayed.
- Through the CCTV covering all points of access staff will be observant of adults buying alcohol for young people to consume and where possible will prevent the sale taking place and refuse any future sales to that individual.
- Ensure that written records are maintained to evidence due diligence in relation to protecting children from harm -. consistent maintenance of a refusal log; up to date records of staff training; (this should include a record of actions taken in response to an incident)

The applicant, on behalf of the Trading Standards Section believes that these conditions are being undermined by the propensity to sell illegal tobacco products to a young person who was 16 years old and the further concealment of illicit tobacco products being stored on the premises.

On $9^{\text {th }}$ December 2016 a copy of a 'Crimestoppers' report was forwarded by West Midlands Police to the Trading Standards Section stating that illegal tobacco products were being sold from premises and were being stored in the boot of Mr Qadiri's car.

On $19^{\text {th }}$ December 2016, 129 packets of illegal tobacco products were found in the boot of Mr Qadiri's car however none were found in the shop. Mr Qadiri stated he knew nothing about the illegal tobacco products and he regularly gave his car keys to people. On this occasion he gave them to his friend (the same one as mentioned above) and had unknown to him placed the illegal products in the boot. His friend claimed that whilst on the way to work he was approached by an unknown Polish man who offered him cigarettes. He paid $£ 275$ cash and did not want to take them to

work, so popped into the shop and stored them in the boot of Mr Qadiri's car. He stated he always buys off people in the street and he knows they could be stolen. On
$8^{\text {th }}$ March 2017 warning letters were issued to Mr Qadiri (appended at 4 below) and his friend.

On $22^{\text {nd }}$ May 2017 a visit was made to the premises and 86 packs of cigarettes were seized as they were not in plain packaging and did not display the new larger pictorial warnings, as were required after $20^{\text {th }}$ May 2017.

## Conclusion:

The sale of tobacco products at a price of $£ 3$ shows that duty and value added tax have been evaded and in May 2017 a minimum excise duty for cigarettes was implemented by the UK government to strengthen the price threshold for cigarettes. The aim of maintaining a high price for tobacco products, having clear labelling in English with warnings and pictures that are unpleasant facts about tobacco use is aimed at dissuading high use or young people from starting to use tobacco products. This follows a stance across Europe which has been adopted in the United Kingdom by the tight regulation of tobacco products. In fact the UK Government has now adopted more stringent controls by introducing plain packaging to further restrict the marketing of cigarette and tobacco products to young consumers who may be tempted to start using tobacco products.

It is the opinion of the applicant that:

- Mohammed Naseer Qadiri does not adhere to the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder and protection of children from harm.
- He may continue to sell illegal cigarettes from this shop to those under 18, unless he is given a deterrent to dissuade him from this activity.
- The sale of foreign labelled or counterfeit tobacco products in disregard of the age of the purchaser shows no concern about the implications of such sales.
- Additionally, the obstruction of an officer by Mr Qadiri hampers the investigation of criminal offences and shows an unwillingness to assist this authority's enforcement officers.
- The circumstances of this case should be considered particularly seriously as detailed in para 11.27 of the statutory guidance in relation to underage sales and smuggled goods.

The officer requests the following action to be considered in this instance:
1 Revoke the Premise Licence, or
2 Suspend the Premise Licence for a period of three months, and/or
3 Terminate Mohammed Naseer Qadiri's position as the DPS at this premises, and / or any other premises.

## Dear Mr Qadici

I write with reference to the visit that was made by Officers from Trading Standards to your shop on $9^{\text {ma }}$ December 2016 whenillegaltobacco products were foundin your motor vehicle a BMW registration mark RE02 VRU

The tobacco products were seized because they were foreign and/or non-duty paid and/or counterfeit. Following the seizure you andAdam Waite, who occasionally works in your shop, attended Council offices where you were interviewed under Caution. During the interview you stated that that the seized tobacco produds belonged to Mr Waite and you had allowed him to store them in your car earlier that day.

I must advise you to never allow anyone to store any illegal goods in your shop or vehicles associatedwith you as this couldlead to prosecution. It could also have a direct affect on your business as your alcohol licence may be reviewed.

For your information tobacco products sold in the United Kingdom must comply with the following:-

- All products containing tobacco should have a warning in the form of a picture.
- Any informationrequiredto be displayed on tobacco products should be in English.
- The amount of tar, nicotine and carbon monoxide levels should be stated.
- The packet should display 'UK DUTY PAID'.
- Each packet of cigarettes should indicate a code that can trace the packet to its place, time and date of manufacture.

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If any products containing tobacco are sold, or are inyour possession for supply which do not meet any of these requirements you commit an offence. This will indude cigarettes, pouches of tobacco, chewing tobacco, shisha etc.

Additionally, it is illegal to sellorhave in possessionforsale any counterfeit tobacco products (i.e. to bacco products which bear a registeredtrade mark, without the authority of the trade mark holder). Sellingillegaltobacco products etc. is a serious criminal offence and has resulted in large fines being issued by the criminal courts.

Please note, it does not matter if you are not yourself present in the shop and as such, you need to instruct all your employeeshworkers not to sell any illegal tobacco products.

On this occasion l intend closing the matter withthis letter of warning but you should be aware a copy of this letter will be kept onfile and will be takeninto consideration in the event of you being involved in similar offences inthe future. If you have any questions regardingthis letter or require any further assistance please contact me on 02476831863.
Youshould also be aware that from 21 May 2017: all relevant tobacco products which are to be sold or supplied to the UK market must be in the new Tobacco Products Directive and standardised packaging (as applicable).

## LICENSING SUB-COMMITTEE

## HEARING PROCEDURE NOTE

1. The Members of the Sub-committee will enter the hearing room.
2. The Chair will introduce the Members of the Sub-committee and its supporting officers (normally a legal adviser and a minute taker) and will ask each of the parties (and their representatives) to identify themselves.
3. The Chair will ask if the parties have received and understood the procedure note (and in particular that cross-examination by the parties is not allowed) and whether anyone present would like the procedure explained further?
4. The Chair will confirm any relevant further documents the licensing authority has received before the hearing and will be considering, and will ask the parties whether there are any other documents they now wish to present (subject to the other parties' consent) and their reasons for doing so.
5. The Chair will ask if any party wishes to call witnesses in support of their case and their reasons for doing so.
6. The Licensing Officer will give a brief description of the application, confirm whether all relevant application formalities have been complied with and where relevant, that the authority has notified the parties of any points that the authority wanted clarification on at the hearing?
7. The Chair will invite the applicant/licensee/review applicant (or representative) to present their case (maximum 20 minutes).
8. The Chair will invite Members of the Sub-committee to ask the applicant/licensee/review applicant (or representative) questions.
9. The Chair will invite each objector/review review respondent (or representative) to present their case (maximum 20 minutes each)
10. The Chair will invite Members of the Sub-committee to ask each objector/review respondent (or representative) questions.
11. The Chair will invite each objector/review respondent (or representative) to sum up their case and if they wish, to comment on anything said by any other party (maximum 10 minutes).
12. The Chair will invite the applicant/licensee/review applicant to sum up their case and if they wish, to comment on anything said by any other party (maximum 10 minutes).
*[13. The Members of the Sub-committee will retire with their supporting officers to make their decision.

14 The Members of the Sub-committee and their supporting officers will return to the hearing room and the Chair will invite the Committee Solicitor to inform the meeting of the decision made, any facts relied on, the reasons for the decision and any specific legal advice given.]
15. The Sub-committee's decision will be confirmed in a written Notice of Determination that will be issued to all parties within 10 working days of the determination.

* Where permitted by the Act, the Chair may close the meeting at this point and re-convene the meeting in private at a later date for the Sub-committee to make its decision.

## Briefing Note 7 - Hearing to Consider an Application to Review a Premises Licence

## Background

A premises licence remains in force in perpetuity (unless a time-limited licence has been granted). Where the way in which the premises are being run gives rise to concerns relevant to the licensing objectives it is possible for the licence to be re-examined by the Licensing Authority. The Licensing Authority cannot review a licence of its own volition but must do so in one of two circumstances:
(a) where a review application has been accepted from a "responsible authority" or any other person; or
(b) where the Magistrates' Court has triggered a review following a closure order.

Where a review application is made it is served on the licensee, Responsible Authorities and is advertised by the licensing authority. Responsible Authorities or anyone else can 'join in' on the review by making their own representations.

A hearing is required to determine whether the licence should be allowed to continue or to continue with modifications.

## Human Rights Act

The hearing procedure and the availability of a statutory right of appeal comply with the Article 6 requirement to provide a fair hearing when determining the licensee's and objectors' civil rights. A decision to modify, suspend or revoke a premises licence will interfere with the licensee's property rights and Article1 Protocol1 will be engaged requiring such action to be in the public interest and to be a proportional response to meeting the four licensing objectives.

## The Sub-committee's powers

Having heard from the review applicant and anyone else making "relevant representations" and the licensee, the sub-committee may:
(a) take no action; or
(b) issue an informal warning letter; or
(c) modify the conditions of licence*; or
(d) exclude a licensable activity from taking place on the premises; or
(e) remove the designated premises supervisor; or
(f) suspend a licence for up to 3 months; or
(g) revoke the licence.
[* controls on live or recorded music that are suspended by the Live Music Act 2012 and SI 2014/3253 can also be reintroduced at a review.]

## Rights of Appeal

An aggrieved licensee can appeal to Coventry Magistrates' Court against actions (c) - (g) above and anyone else can appeal against actions (a) - (f). Any decision taken by a sub-committee does not take effect until after the period for lodging an appeal has elapsed or, where an appeal has been lodged, until the appeal is disposed of by the magistrates' court.


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
